

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

As we consider the Corporal Works of Mercy on these Sundays of Lent, we now come to: "visit the imprisoned." Last week I commented on "visit the sick." We need to bring the love of Christ to those who are suffering illness. But the mandate to "visit the imprisoned" can pose a much greater challenge. First, we must overcome any negative sentiments toward people who are incarcerated (*They deserve what they get! Why should I care about them?!*) and see them as God sees them: human beings with a fundamental dignity that not even the most grievous wrongdoing can take away. God loves every individual and does not want to lose anyone. While we must in some way atone for our sinfulness, God wants a "happy ending" for each and every person.

Secondly, if someone were to contemplate visiting the imprisoned, it can be both intimidating and burdensome to enter such an institution. But that is a small sacrifice. Years ago I was a last-minute sub for a prison Mass and I found it to be a very good experience. The men truly appreciated that I came to celebrate Mass. They showed a spiritual hunger that was all the more real because of the restrictions imposed on them and the scarcity of Catholics who were willing and able to engage in prison ministry.

Most people will never actually visit the imprisoned. But, perhaps we can start by not forgetting about them. Perhaps we can start by caring about them and praying for them.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"The floor is lava!" We used to play this game as children, and it still seems popular today: you arrange furniture and other objects in such a way as to make it from point to point, and even room to room, without touching the floor. There may be more than one way to go, but the crux of the matter is that you have to use these waypoints to stay alive in the game. Following Jesus is somewhat similar, although obviously infinitely more serious and important! He himself, through his sacrifice on the cross, opened the doors of salvation to us - he has provided the ways and means to live free from death. His sacrifice is the only thing that makes it possible for us to enter heaven. In other words, he has arranged the spiritual furniture, made clear those waypoints, and, differing from children who play the lava game, is ready and willing to help us at any time to move safely and confidently along the journey. St Paul writes, "we are his handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for the good works that God has prepared in advance, that we should live in them."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

St. Paul also writes, "by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not from you; it is the gift of God." And in today's Gospel, St. John writes these words we know so well. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." Both testaments include words of comfort, but John here also includes a call to action. Notice the word "might." Like "may," which is found in other translations, it indicates possibility, probability, and contingency. In other words, it is offered – freely given! – but we must accept. And acceptance means, just as the prophets shared with the Israelites, we need to follow God's commands. It means that in our words and deeds we act from and in love of God and love of one another. For "whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God."

ENGAGE Today we are about halfway through Lent. If you haven't yet taken advantage of the rich opportunity to pray the Stations of the Cross with your family, do so this week. Most parishes pray the stations on Fridays during Lent, and perhaps other days as well. This ancient tradition of our Church is a beautiful and meaningful way to walk the Way of the Cross with our Lord.

We adore you, O Christ, and bless you. Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the whole world.

DO YOU HAVE A LOVED ONE IN THE HOSPITAL?

The HIPPA privacy protection act prohibits the release of patient information admitted to hospitals or nursing homes. Each facility interprets HIPPA differently which often precludes the sharing of this information with your pastor.

In the event of a loved one being hospitalized or admitted to a long term care facility, an authorized family member should inform the parish office.

If Father's schedule permits he will visit your loved one. Remember the number of our priests in the area have dwindled. If it is an EMERGENCY, we will have a priest attend to your loved ones needs in a timely fashion. Please do not wait until the last possible moment to contact a priest. Please also note that patients admitted through the Emergency Room are not asked to specify a religion/priest/or parish. A Family member needs to inform the parish office.

What is the St. Monica Ministry? The St. Monica Ministry was founded at St. Theresa Parish, Hellertown, in November, 2022.
