

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

Today we begin the Advent season once again. As life gets even busier for many of us leading up to Christmas, Advent is a great gift. It helps us slow down (as least interiorly) and place our Lord at the center of our lives.

This time of year is filled with many things of a material nature, things that touch our senses (decorations, music, cards and gifts, food). We even use a visual symbol in church to help us focus on Advent: the Advent wreath. But the greatest realities in our lives are not material. The Advent wreath actually reminds us of some of them. As you may or may not know, the four Advent candles traditionally stand for four things: hope, faith, joy, and peace. Perhaps we can reflect on each of these over these four Sundays of Advent.

The candle for the First Sunday of Advent stands for *hope*. Many people experience fears and anxiety about the future. Maybe anxiety over tomorrow. Maybe anxiety over one's salvation at the end of this life. Advent reminds us that we are anticipating the Second Coming of Jesus and that, in the end, Jesus will be victorious. He has already conquered sin, evil, suffering, and death by His own death and resurrection. In the end, that victory will claim dominion over everything and everyone. Everything will be set right. Thus, Advent invites us to *hope*: to look to the future with confidence. This is not mere optimism or wishful thinking. Hope is grounded in reality. God always takes care of us and Jesus will be victorious in the end.

In these weeks of Advent, whenever you experience any fear or anxiety about the future, ask our Lord to increase your hope.

For centuries on Christmas Eve, families in Poland, Lithuania, Czech Republic and Slovakia have practiced a beautiful tradition. It is the breaking and sharing of the Oplatek – Christmas Wafer. Oplatek taken from the Latin word oblatum, meaning Sacred Bread, has been the symbol of Christianity and Jesus Christ our bread of life since the Last Supper. The host or hostess leads in a special prayer and distributes an oplatek to the participants. Each person breaks off a piece of the other's oplatek and continues until they have exchanged good wishes and blessings with everyone.

Is 63:16B-17, 19B; 64:2-7 | 1 Cor 1:3-9 | Mk 13:33-37

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In a nineteenth-century sermon, St. John Henry Newman wrote of today's Gospel: "[Jesus] mercifully whispers into our ears ... not to share in the general unbelief [around us], not to be carried away by the world but to 'beware, keep alert' and look out for his coming." I love the thought that Jesus is "mercifully whispering" to us. Welcome to Advent! We know that Advent is a time of anticipation and preparing our hearts for the coming of Christ, but today's readings also speak to me of training ourselves to be alert for God's presence in the small, everyday moments of our lives. In his Letter to the Corinthians, Paul writes that "[we] are not lacking in any spiritual gift" as we await the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are gifted with his grace. Our loving God bestows countless graces on us each day, and with the help of the Holy Spirit we can seek ways to be more aware of these graces. Yes, we can be more "alert" to them, but can also be thankful for these small moments of God's presence with us.

GO EVANGELIZE PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Advent is a season of joyful hope. "I hope I can get my Christmas shopping done in time ... I hope I have time to get my house decorated this weekend." We all have "hopes and dreams" for this time of year, and, God-willing we will be blessed with a truly festive and joyous holiday season with our families. For Catholics, though, this season of "joyful hope" is one that has a much deeper meaning. We long for the return of Christ and our eternal union with him with a hope that is built on the promises of Jesus in the Scriptures. Our hope is not passive, but active. We know that God is always there for us, comforting us in bad times and rejoicing with us in times of happiness. Let us give thanks for our Triune God who desires to be in relationship with us enough that he sent his Son to take on our humanity. And let us silence any noise in our hearts so as to hear Jesus' merciful whisper of encouragement to be on the watch for his coming.
