Message from Father Bobbin


Dear Parishioners,

We congratulate our students who just received First Penance this Saturday, December 3, as they continue to prepare for First Communion in the spring. This week we celebrate a holy day, the Immaculate Conception of Mary. We are reminded that this is a holy day of obligation because the Church recognizes that this day is important enough for all Catholics to pause and join together in celebrating this mystery of our faith. By a special grace of God, Mary was preserved from original sin and all sin so that she could offer a totally pure "yes" to God on behalf of all humanity. None of us are completely free of sin, but God has given us a great treasure in the Sacrament of Penance. Following the example of our young people who just celebrated First Penance with preparation and enthusiasm, the Advent season calls us to revisit Confession, no matter what we might have to confess or how long it may have been since our last Confession.

On another note... As you have noticed, our altar servers are now wearing white vestments for Mass. Typically, altar servers wear either a cassock and surplice or an alb. The red vestments worn by our servers were something of a liturgical anomaly, so I decided to switch to albs for the servers. An alb is a plain white vestment worn by clergy and other liturgical ministers. It is a reminder of the "white garment" we receive in Baptism as a sign of our Christian identity. The word *alb* comes from the Latin word for "white." With the alb, the servers wear a cincture (the rope used as a belt) in the color of the day or season, currently violet for Advent.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Harmony. It can seem so elusive in these times when our newsfeeds bombard us with reminders of what's wrong with our world: war, political conflicts, hunger, injustice, violence. We may also experience discord in our homes or within our hearts. Perhaps that is why the beautiful imagery in Isaiah's prophecy, where Isaiah envisions a world transformed by the coming of the Messiah, strikes a chord as we prepare for Christ's coming: We picture the wolf lying beside the lamb, and the calf with the lion. All will be right with the world. As we reflect on the areas in our lives that lack harmony, we are reminded to focus on Jesus and the Father, the source of all good. Through prayer and reflection on our Advent readings, we can "prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I have a "smart" alarm clock. To shut it off, I just have to say, "Alexa, turn off my alarm." Easy, right? Well, too easy, it turns out, because lately I've slept right through the one-sided conversation. But it's hard to miss John's wake-up call: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" Perhaps, though, we've become complacent; we've heard it so often that we skip right past it. That can happen during Advent, this season of preparation and, yes, repentance. I love our family traditions – candy every day, in the morning!; our well-worn Nativity set; lighting the Advent candles; Christmas concerts and gatherings. None of those are bad, of course, but in the blur of the season we must be challenged by John the Baptist's words to prepare not only our homes but our hearts for Christ's coming. During this season, we can examine our lives to separate the wheat from the chaff, focusing on those things that bring us closer to the Lord and one another. As St. Paul encourages the Romans, "Welcome one another, then, as Christ welcomed you, for the glory of God."

PRAY St. Paul's words above give us pretty clear instruction for how to live out our faith by welcoming others as Christ has welcomed us. Reflect on these words during daily Advent reflection this week: When have we welcomed others in our lives – and truly loved them? How can we do that for someone in the coming days?
