

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

Last week we started to look at the last book of the Bible, Revelation. We noted that this book is not some secret code that predicts the end of the world or events in history. Rather, it is another way of presenting the Gospel message, using a unique style known as apocalyptic literature.

Why would the Gospel be presented in this way? Revelation is believed to have been composed by the Apostle John, the same John who is the source of the Gospel According to John, and three of the New Testament letters. It has been suggested that John is writing to a Christian community facing persecution. Therefore, he writes in a way that is highly symbolic. Even though Revelation does not predict *future* events in history, it does refer to certain *contemporary* events. For example, the use of the number 666 corresponds to the name *Nero*, the first Roman emperor to persecute Christians. (In Hebrew, the letters of the alphabet are also used as numbers. The letters of Nero's name add up to this number.)

Speaking of symbolic numbers, Revelation uses the number 7 a lot. This is the number of perfection or fulfillment. Half of 7 is three-and-a-half. This number refers to a time of tribulation. Take note when some equivalent of three-and-a-half is used in Revelation and other biblical books.

One of the most important keys to understanding Revelation is that it is very liturgical. The book describes John's visions received on the *Lord's Day*, Sunday. He describes the worship of God in heaven. This points to the ultimate fulfillment of the Gospel: the victory of good over evil and eternal worship of God in heaven.


Advent Penance Service

For centuries on Christmas Eve, families in Poland, Lithuania, Czech Republic and Slovakia have practiced a beautiful tradition. It is the breaking and sharing of the Oplatek - Christmas Wafer. Oplatek taken from the Latin word oblatum, meaning Sacred Bread, has been the symbol of Christianity and Jesus Christ our bread of life since the Last Supper. The host or hostess leads in a special prayer and distributes an oplatek to the participants. Each person breaks off a piece of the other's oplatek and continues until they have exchanged good wishes and blessings with everyone.







Grow & Go

Third Sunday of Advent

Is 35:1-6a, 10 | Jas 5:7-10 | Mt 11:2-11

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE One morning, I woke up feeling exhausted after a fitful night of sleep. I was achy and generally under the weather. Despite this, I made a to-do list because the day's work still needed to be accomplished. I was determined to not let this sickness interrupt my productivity, even though I knew I needed to rest. It occurred to me, then, that rest - and dependence on others and God - is sacred also. In today's psalm, we hear of the many ways the Lord provides: The Lord gives, the Lord raises, the Lord loves, the Lord protects, the Lord saves. We cannot accomplish our own salvation, but we can rest in the promise the Lord provides, and we can hope in the salvation offered in Christ. As we wait in joyful anticipation for the coming of Jesus at Christmas, let us find time to rest in his Word and his presence, trusting that our salvation does not depend on us and has already

come to fruition in Christ.

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we saw in our psalm, God is the one who takes initiative, who provides for our salvation. In our work to share the faith with others, sometimes our task is simply to help others become aware of the ways God is providing for them by pointing out the signs of his action in their lives. When the disciples of John came to Jesus asking if he was "the one who is to come" or whether they should "look for another," Jesus reminds them of the evidence all around them: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, and the dead are raised. As we help others to see God's work in their lives, we are also leading them to greater faith and trust in him.

REST

We are more able to see the signs of God's providence in our lives when we take time to reflect. Make time to rest in God's presence this week. This could mean stopping into a chapel for a couple minutes of quiet prayer, reflecting on Scripture using *Lectio Divina*, or reading the story of Christ's nativity in the Gospel. These simple practices will prepare our hearts to recognize Christ's presence and goodness at each moment of our lives.
